PATONS INCA 50g balls

Scarf (colour 7043) 4

Beanie

Main Colour (**M** – 7043) 2 2 3 3

If making with pom pon, add 1 ball in contrast colour (**C**).

Use only the yarn specified. Other yarns are likely to produce different results.

Quantities are approximate as they can vary between knitters. Check the ball bands to ensure all yarn is from the same dye lot.

NEEDLES AND EXTRAS

- 1 pair 7.00mm (UK 2) knitting needles or size needed to give correct tension.
- wool needle for finishing.
- pom pon maker or cardboard (optional).

TENSION

12.5 sts and 23 rows to 10cm over garter st, using 7.00mm needles.

To work a tension square, using 7.00mm needles, cast on 19 sts. Work 34 rows garter st (every row knit). Cast off loosely. Check your tension carefully.

If less sts to 10cm use smaller needles, if more sts use bigger needles.

With correct yarn and tension, your Beanie and Scarf will look like our photograph.

SCARF

Using 7.00mm needles, cast on 20 sts.

Knit in garter st (every row knit) until Scarf measures 140cm from beg.

Cast off loosely.

TO MAKE UP

DO NOT PRESS. Sew in ends.



BEANIE (worked sideways)

Using 7.00mm needles and **M**, cast on **28** (32-36-40) sts.

1st row (wrong side) – Knit.

Knit in garter st (every row knit) until Beanie measures **45** (47-49-52) cm from beg, working last row on wrong side.

Cast off loosely.

TO MAKE UP

NOTE – We recommend using mattress st to sew up your handknit.


DO NOT PRESS. Join cast-on and cast-off edges together, reversing the seam for **6** (7-8-9) cm from one edge for turn back of brim. Using wool needle and length of yarn, gather top of beanie by threading yarn through garter st ridges across top edge, pull up firmly and fasten off securely.

If desired, using pom pon maker or two circles of cardboard **12** (12-14-14) cm in diameter with a 4cm hole in the centre and **C**, make a floppy pom pon (see overleaf). Attach to the top of the Beanie.


POM PONS

Pom pon makers can be bought at yarn stores, or pom pons can be made by using cardboard and following the easy steps below.

1. Cut out two circles of cardboard for your pom pon. Cut the hole in the centre of both circles (the diameter of the hole should be 1/4 the diameter of the circle).



2. Put the two circles together and wind yarn round and round the cardboard.




3. If you are making a standard pom pon, keep winding until the centre hole is completely filled up. If you prefer a floppy pom pon, cover the cardboard, but do not fill the centre hole.




4. Place the point of a pair of scissors between the two circles of cardboard and cut around the yarn, keeping the scissors between the circles all the time.



5. Using a strand of yarn, wrap it round between the two circles of cardboard, knot firmly and take away the cardboard.



6. Trim the pom pon.



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
